Making plurals

Singular: one Plural: more than one

Remember: When you change a noun from singular to plural, you do not need to use an apostrophe

Most nouns are made into plurals by adding <u>s</u> Make the following into plurals:

Cat School Ruler Piano Game Trainer Spoon Rope Chair Tune

Some nouns ending in <u>a</u> are made into plurals by adding <u>es</u> Make the following into plurals:

Cargo Echo Hero Potato Tomato

Most nouns ending in hissing, shushing or buzzing sounds end in <u>es</u> Make the following into plurals:

Sandwich Brush Box Catch Glass Watch

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Quiz Bench Match

Most nouns ending in **f** or **fe** change to **ves** in the plural (remember to take off the <u>f</u> or the <u>fe</u> before you add the <u>ves</u>!) Make the following into plurals:

Y words: For words ending in a <u>vowel</u> and then <u>v</u>, just add <u>s</u> For words ending in a <u>consonant</u> and then <u>v</u>, you change the <u>v</u> to an <u>and then add <u>es</u> (Vowels are: a, e, i, o, u) (Consonants: all the other letters)</u>

Look carefully at each word before you make it a plural. Is there a consonant just before the $\frac{y}{2}$ or is it a vowel? Take your time!

Some nouns keep the same spelling for singular and plural forms Learn these:

Deer Fish Salmon Sheep

Some nouns have no singular form, just plural Learn these:

Trousers Scissors Tweezers
